Welcoming Remarks

Welcome to Nagoya University!

It is a great pleasure for the organizing members of IEDF 2017 to host you. That many of you travel long distances remind us all just how important this annual event is for the scholarly community of international educational development of Japan and South Korea.

Graduate School of International Development, Nagoya University, was established in 1991 as the first graduate school in Japan, which specialize in training professionals and academics in the field of international development. In the past twenty six years, it has produced more than 1,500 masters and 300 doctors, who are working as policy-makers and practitioners of international organizations, governments, and civil society organizations. Many have also developed their careers in academia. In addition to the mission to equip students with techniques and knowledge for their development work, this graduate school has also aimed to be the center of academic investigation to lead to Asian theories and models of development and international cooperation, based on the critical examination of western approaches.

In 2014, the Japanese government has co-hosted the UNESCO World Conference on ESD (Education for Sustainable Development) in Nagoya. Aichi-Nagoya Declaration, which was adopted then, has been eagerly acted on by school teachers and civil society actors to promote education for cultivating values and attitudes to achieve sustainable development within Japan and globally. ESD was also incorporated as a part of Target Seven of SDG4, together with Global Citizenship Education, which is promoted in South Korea. Those of us who have been involved in IEDF had also been working in partnership to promote ESD and SDGs. The importance of such partnership will grow even further, as SDG4.7 is one of the most debated fields in the international education community.

Given the history and missions of the graduate school, we recognize the importance of a meeting like IEDF, which gather scholars and students from two leading Asian countries in this field. We sincerely hope that this platform will continue to foster the collaboration among participants and serve as the seedbed of young talents.

While Nagoya is a city of manufacturing, it is also known to have produced many famous warlords during fifteenth and sixteenth century. I hope you will have a chance to explore some historical buildings and sites.
