She works at University for Development Studies (UDS), Tamale, Ghana, since 1995. Her main areas of interest include water and ecosystem management, irrigation, climate change and new approaches to tertiary education in developing countries. She has also collaborated on several projects, funded by JICA, AFD, WHO, GEF, etc., with local and international partners. She is currently serving as Director of Office for Linkages and International Relationships of the UDS (UDS International). She has published about 75 professional papers incl. books, journals and made numerous conference presentations.

Brief description of the lecture

She will discuss recent developments in African tertiary education through examples from University for Development Studies (UDS), Ghana, where main emphases is on training of practically oriented experts who are able to integrate community-based approach into their tertiary education. UDS sends between 6,000 – 8,000 undergraduate students for two months during every academic year to communities across Northern Ghana to learn first-hand about rural life. During their stay, students collect

valuable data that can be used subsequently by local government, national health programmes, etc. Programme is supervised by local stakeholders as well as academic staff of the UDS. Tracer studies have highlighted the importance of the Third Trimester Field Practical Programme (TTFPP) in increasing graduate's job opportunities as well as fine-tuning their early professional development.
